PH opened its first Baltimore site in 2006. We now have 4 sites in Baltimore and work with over 130 undergraduates at 3 universities.

Family Help Desk

The Family Help Desk (FHD) is a resource and advocacy program that helps families' access community resources critical to their health, safety, and economic survival. Volunteers talk with families at the desk about their resource needs and connect them with appropriate local services and benefits related to food, housing, health insurance, immigration, childcare, adult education, and job training. Volunteers then follow-up with clients and service providers to ensure that families receive the necessary resources and to troubleshoot or provide additional services as necessary.

Locations:

The Harriet Lane Clinic (HLC)

200 North Wolfe St. Baltimore, MD 21287 -- accessible via JHMI shuttle

This pediatric clinic, associated with Johns Hopkins Children's Center, serves roughly 7,000 children annually. A dedicated team of renowned health professionals including pediatricians, pediatric residents, nurses, social workers and lawyers, provide comprehensive care and services to Baltimore City families.

Children's Medical Practice (Bayview)

4940 Eastern Avenue Baltimore, MD 21224 -- accessible via JHMI/Bayview shuttles

Serving as one of the primary pediatric clinics for the growing Latino community, this facility is located at the Johns Hopkins Bayview Medical Center and serves low-income children and families on Baltimore's east side, with about 9,000 children visits every year. Pediatricians, medical students, pediatric residents and fellows, pediatric nurse practitioner and other clinic staff work together to improve the health of children and adolescents within the context of their family and community.

Spanish-speaking volunteers are greatly desired, and students who speak Spanish are strongly encouraged to apply to this site.

Each volunteer attends:

- Training (multiple locations): 10 – 15 hours during first 2 weeks after acceptance.
- One shift (at the clinic): 2 hours/week with a shift partner - shift consistent every week determined by volunteer and program at beginning of each semester.
- Follow-up shifts (on campus): 2 hours/week, regular times determined by volunteers
- Reflection session (on campus): 1 hour/week, regular time determined by program.
- Project HEALTH events (multiple locations): throughout the year – includes social, advocacy, fundraising, and other events on campus and in the community.

iii. the application process

Important dates for applicants:

- **Application Deadline: Sunday, September 13th by 5 pm:**
Applications must be submitted via our online applications system. To request a link to the online application system, email Brian Spendley at spendley@projecthealth.org.

Applicants who are selected to advance will be contacted to schedule an interview.

- **Interview: Week of September 14th (Sept 15-17):** Interviews conducted by student leaders during the week of September 14th. Our programs are lead by students who serve as Program Coordinators and Campus Coordinators.
- **Trainings: Saturday September 19th – Sunday September 20th:** Program trainings and clinic orientation. Exact dates and times for the trainings during the remainder of the week will be given prior to interviews.
